

WINCHESTER.

SATURDAY, NOVEMBER 10, 1810.

Tuesday last being the Anniversary of the Aliens' Society, in this City, established for Apprenticing Poor Boys and Girls, the Stewards and Gentlemen met at St. John's House, and walked, in procession, to the Cathedral Church, where an elegant and very appropriate sermon was preached by the Rev. D. Williams. The Company afterwards returned to St. John's House, and partook of an excellent dinner served up by Mrs. Attwood. The collection for the Charity, at the Church and the Rooms, amounted to upwards of £133. The Rev. Gilbert Heathcote and Mr. Timothy D. Pinnock were elected Stewards for the year ensuing.

On Tuesday last a post-chaise, belonging to the Dolphins Inn, at Southampton, was returning to that place from Winchester, when Jas. Norris, the driver, and passengers, got down at the bottom of Compton Hill, near this place, to ease the horses. As soon as they had reached the top of the hill the horses started, and the driver, in endeavouring to stop them, got under the wheels of the chaise, which went over him, broke one of his legs, and dislocated the other knee. He has been brought to the County Hospital, and is likely to do well.

Thirty days working weather will so far complete the Canal, that boats of 40 or 50 tons burthen may pass from Bristol to London without shifting. The guns on Sydney Wharf were fired on the above occasion.

The First Devon Regiment of Militia moved last week from Hythe, by way of Ashford and Maidstone, on their route to Ipswich, in Suffolk. When the above Regiment halted at Lenham, on Friday morning last, Captain Fulford gave a breakfast, at the Dog and Bear Inn, to all the women and children of the regiment, who sat down, 56 in number, and were liberally entertained at his expense.

On Sunday last died, at Broughton, in this county, in consequence of a fall from his horse the preceding Friday, Mr. James Hicks, of Romsey, whose loss will be regretted by a large circle of acquaintance, by whom he was much respected.

On Thursday last died, at his apartments in College-green, Bristol, Lieutenant-Colonel Frith, of the North Hampshire Regiment of Militia.
